Draw me as good a house as you can, states it well. Once the picture of a house is completed, the test-taker is asked to draw a tree, and later a person. Whichever way, drawing gives us a sense of revisiting our childhood memories full of such fun activities. Similar to writing, the act of drawing forms a powerful medium for us to let our emotions out. As we know, and some of us might even have experienced, that forms of fine art, including drawing, are seen to be stress-releasing activities. Off the mind and onto the paper.
